I have learned so much while attending California State University Monterey Bay and being a Spanish major. My fellow Spanish students are united and have made the learning experience here worthwhile. Not only have they made me feel welcome, but they have also made me feel like part of a family. Thanks to my peers, I am not alone in the journey of obtaining my B.A in Spanish. The classes that I have taken have made me learn more, not only about the culture but also about myself. For example, in taking Spanish 365 Chicano Narrative, I have been able to identify with a lot of the stories we have read in class. Not only was I able to

identify with the readings, but I also learned a lot about my culture that I was unaware of. Not only did I learn a lot from the Spanish 364, but I also learned a lot from taking Spanish 330. Spanish 330 opened my eyes to the history that has occurred and I was blinded to it since we never learned about such topics in regular Spanish classes.
